Our Story

Giving back to those who have served all of us so honorably and courageously

The Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation began in 2007 in Tyler shortly after retired Senior PGA Tour professional Dick Goetz met PGA professional Ron Nash of Dallas, a retired Navy Lt. Commander, at a golf tournament in Dallas.

Goetz had recently spent some time on the driving range with seriously injured wounded warriors at Camp LeJeune, N.C., helping them with their golf swings and basic fundamentals of the game.

Goetz and Nash discussed the idea of bringing some wounded warriors to Tyler for a Pro-Am. They co-founded the birth of the Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation.

The inaugural event in 2008 was a one-day Pro-Am with seven wounded warriors from Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio participating. The following year, a two-day event for 17 wounded warriors included a party the first night and a Pro-Am the next day.

Over the past seventeen years, we have expanded our golf events throughout the state of Texas to include Amarillo, Dallas, Ft. Worth, Horseshoe Bay and Tyler. Each of these Pro-Am events include 25-40 injured warriors and we have added special activities for the spouses of the warriors at several events.

The Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation hosts two retreats with a spiritual emphasis in March and November benefiting 25 warriors and their families.

Several professional golfers, including Bobby Nichols, Mark Brooks, Charles Coody, Homero Blancas, and the late Bruce Lietzke have donated their time helping warriors on the day of the Pro-Am.

Medical experts and military leaders say that letting these men and women vent their frustrations on the golf course helps some of them forget their injuries for a time and create determination they need for

rehabilitation.

Many retired generals (including Maj. Gen. Dave Garza, USMC; Maj. Gen. Paul Landers, USAF; Brig. Gen. Jack Ihle, USAF; Maj. Gen. Bob Dickerson, USMC; Maj. Gen. Bob Dulaney, USAF; Maj. Gen. Greg Champion, US Army; Adm. Mark Ferguson, US Navy; Brig. Gen. Bill Welch, USAF; General Paul Funk, US Army) and other high-ranking military officers have attended the festivities and played in the Pro-Am events. Musicians and comedians from around the country volunteer their time. In 2012, country and western singer Randy Travis entertained the warriors.

While in Tyler, warriors visit schools, where they are given a rousing patriotic welcome by hundreds of students waving American flags. "That greeting meant so much," said one warrior after the event. "I had trouble maintaining my composure."

Businesses from the golfing industry have provided excellent sponsorship support over the years that the Pro-Am events have been held. Over \$8,000,000 has been raised to help wounded warriors since the first Pro-Am was held. More than 1000 wounded warriors and their families have received assistance.

The Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation focuses on providing help to wounded warriors who live in Texas.

"I'm often asked why our organization is necessary since our government is supposed to take care of its wounded military," said Goetz. "Our mission is to help provide assistance when veterans' benefits are slow in getting started or do not meet the full scope of basic needs for warriors and their families." "And in addition, the healing process that takes place at our events between warriors who communicate during the weekend is one of the most rewarding things we see."

The Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation is a 501(c)(3) organization.

Many great ideas start as just a dream. And from those dreams, visions are often born. And a vision put into action, can result in a mission!

Some ten years ago, Richard and Madeline Lewis, Residents and members at Eagle's Bluff in Bullard, Texas turned their Dream, Vision, and Mission into Action by establishing The Richard and Madeline Lewis Scholarship to aid our Warriors and Veterans to achieve their mission, in the pursuit of higher education at the University of Texas at Tyler. Richard was an active member of the Eagle's Bluff "Dew Boys"; a group of dedicated, resident golfers at Eagles Bluff who have patriotic, philanthropic hearts. With Richard's leadership, the Dew Boys wasted no time raising funds that first year for the Lewis Scholarship. That same year, the Chairman of the Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation, Dick Goetz, was introduced to the Dew Boys group and a partnership was formed. The Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation committed to matching any funds raised by the Dew Boys annually and providing those combined funds to the Lewis Scholarship at the University of Texas at Tyler.

Each year the Dew Boys outdo themselves with their efforts. In 2024, their hard work allowed the partnership to provide \$25,000.00

to the University of Texas at Tyler for students attending classes in 2025. To date, the efforts of the Dew Boys, in partnership with the Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation have seen contributions to the University of more than \$225,000.00 with 192 Veteran scholarships awarded.

If you ask any Dew Boy why they are so dedicated to this cause you'll likely hear this, or something similar, as a common response: "It goes without saying that there are no more deserving individuals than those members of our military who selflessly volunteered their service and their lives to our country so we can enjoy the rights and freedoms we enjoy today." Sadly, Richard and Madeline Lewis are no longer with us see the smiles on the faces of those Veterans their scholarships have helped over the years. But if they were, they would be proud of how the Dew Boys have, and will continue to dedicate themselves, to their mission.

It was clear that both organizations truly care about veterans, and it showed in every moment. This trip not only made me feel part of something bigger than myself again, but also solidified my newfound love for the game of golf. I'm deeply grateful for your kindness and generosity.

I recently completed a doctoral degree at Baylor University, where I researched why the post-9/11 combat veteran population experiences significantly higher rates of suicide, homelessness, and unemployment compared to their non-veteran or civilian peers. The results of five years of dedicated study suggest that these statistics stem from the largest civilian-military gap in our nation's 250-year history. This gap arises primarily from the nearly two-decade-long War on Terror, fought exclusively by an All-Volunteer Force (AVF) comprising less than 1% of the population, returning to a civilian society that, for the first time in U.S. history, was not subject to a military draft after 9/11.

The most significant finding from my research study that contributes to the gap centers on the stigma faced by combat veterans and non-veteran civilians. These stigmas include civilians' perceptions of combat-veteran PTSD and a perceived lack of civilian appreciation for the AVF. Such stigmas create a disconnect that further widens the gap, which many post-9/11 combat veterans feel they can never bridge. The Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation (TXWWF) and the Karsten Manufacturing Corporation (PING Golf) are two organizations I have observed and personally experienced making substantial and commendable efforts to close this gap.

In March 2025, Ray Griffiss, Chairman of the TXWWF, reached out to me with an offer to send my wife and me to Phoenix, Arizona, for a Tour Fitting Experience at the PING Golf Headquarters. Ray, a combat veteran and the person who recruited me into the Veteran Golfers Association (VGA)—where I had the opportunity to compete and ultimately win the 2023 VGA National Championship—shared that he had been observing my efforts since my military retirement and wanted to acknowledge my work and research with AM300 Solutions meaningfully and tangibly. With immense gratitude and excitement, I departed for the Karsten Manufacturing Corporation in May 2025 to participate in their Tour Fitting Experience, receive a personal tour of the facility, and prepare the press release for my equipment change to PING golf clubs ahead of the 2025 VGA National Championship.



Upon arriving in Phoenix, I was greeted by Dick Goetz, a Lifetime PGA Member and retired PGA Tour professional, as well as the founder of TXWWF. Accompanying Mr. Goetz were



his wife, Gail, Ray Griffiss, and fellow combat veteran and wounded warrior Paulo Najera, who was also taking part in the Tour Fitting Experience. Within two hours of my arrival, I found myself at the PING Proving Grounds with Dick Goetz and John Solheim, the CEO of PING and Karsten Manufacturing Corporation, who personally oversaw my Tour Fitting Experience with Tour Fitter Nicholas Truitt. Having studied Mechanical Engineering during my undergraduate years, the guided tour of the manufacturing facility with Brian Botha after the club fitting was truly incredible. If the Army operated with just 1% of PING's efficiency, the War on Terror would have concluded much sooner. The culminating highlight of the visit was entering the mystical and now confirmed to be real, PING Putter Vault, where it held every gold-plated PING putter used in a PGA Major Championship win since the 1970s.

After retiring from the U.S. Army in 2012, I realized the significant gap between myself and the civilian society for which I had fought. It took some time, but I ultimately accepted that I might never fully bridge this divide. Even if I am unable to cross it, I have dedicated my professional and academic efforts to helping others do so. However, thanks to organizations like the TXWWF and the Karsten Manufacturing Corporation, along with individuals such as Ray Griffiss, John Solheim, Dick and Gail Goetz, Nicholas Truitt, and Brian Botha, I can say my gap has been unexpectedly narrowed. During the visit, everyone I met went out of their way to express their gratitude for my military service. And for that, I am thankful; however, I want to thank all of you for your service in bridging this divide.

A DAUGHTER'S GRATITUDE FOR GOLF WITH DAD

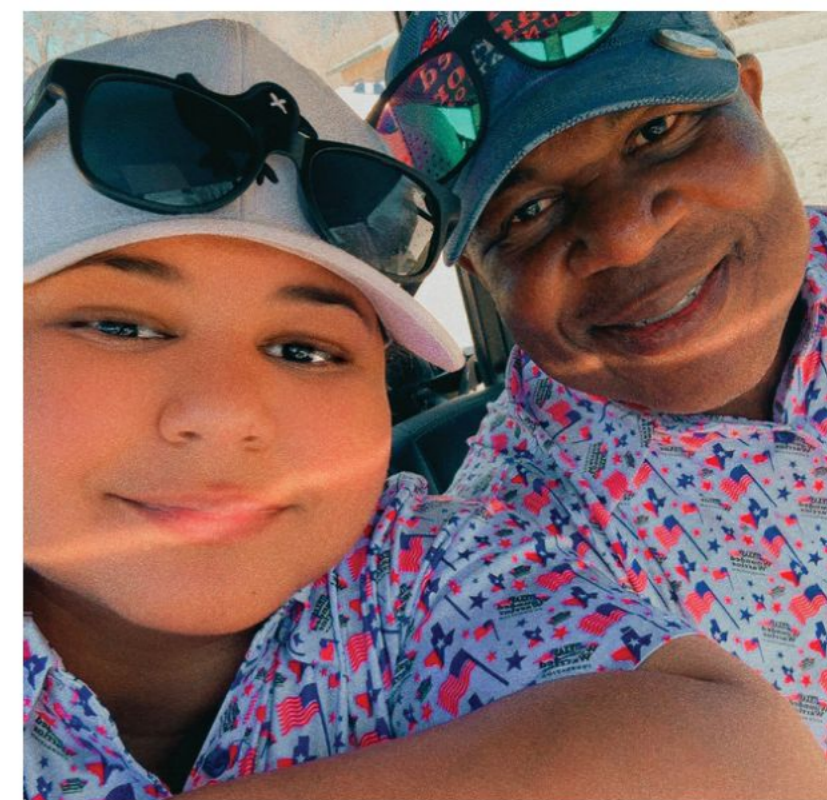

- Retail gift cards for food, clothing, and transportation costs

The core mission of the Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation is to ensure that veterans and their families have the basic necessities of life: shelter, food, clothing, and reliable access to utilities. These fundamental needs form the cornerstone of TXWWF's commitment to those who have served our nation.

Through the continued generosity of partners like IICF, TXWWF is able to fulfill its mission of supporting warriors in their time of need, offering stability, dignity, and hope for a brighter future.

General Paul E. Funk II

General Paul E. Funk II retired in 2022, concluding a distinguished 42-year career of service to the United States Army. In his final assignment, he served as the Commanding General of the U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC), where he was responsible for transforming civilians into professional soldiers and developing leaders committed to selfless service to the nation. Under his leadership, TRADOC oversaw 32 Army schools organized within 10 Centers of Excellence, collectively recruiting, training, and educating more than 800,000 soldiers and service members annually.

Prior to his leadership at TRADOC, General Funk commanded III Corps and Fort Hood, one of the Army's premier corps-level commands, where he directed large-scale training and operations critical to national security. Additionally, he served as the Commanding General of Combined Joint Task Force – Operation Inherent Resolve (CJTF–OIR), where he deployed to lead a 72-nation coalition in the campaign against ISIS in Iraq and Syria. His efforts in this role were instrumental in degrading and defeating ISIS's territorial control, thereby contributing significantly to global stability and security.

General Funk's combat and operational experience includes six deployments in support of Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm, Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Inherent Resolve.

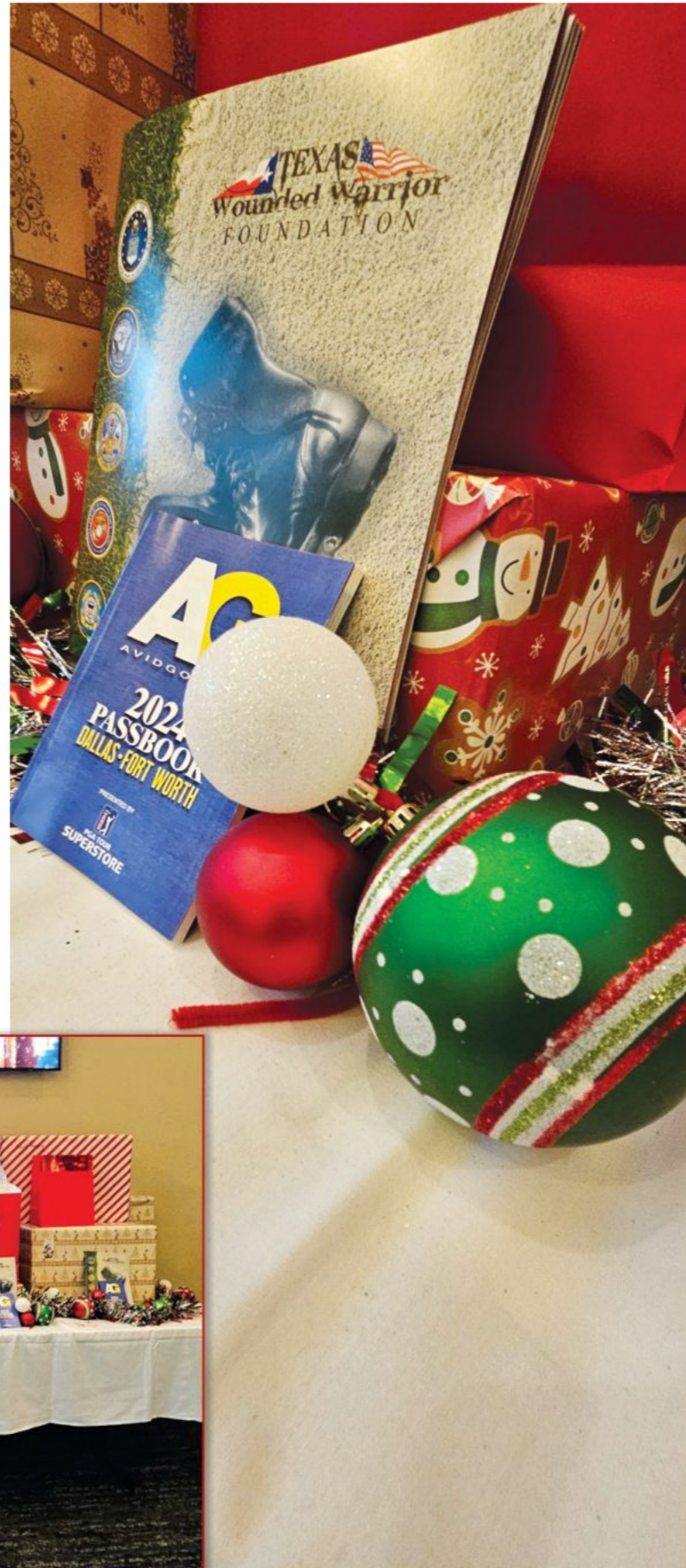
TEXAS WOUNDED WARRIOR FOUNDATION PRESENTS:

My journey started when I raised my right hand and swore an oath on September 6, 1995. I trained at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, then headed to my first duty station in Schofield Barracks, Hawaii. It was there that I found two unexpected loves: a woman named Jaymie-Lyn, and a game called golf. Jaymie and I didn't take the same path at the time — life had other plans — but golf? Golf hooked me the first time I swung and ended up shooting 124. I told myself I'd keep playing until I got better. The fact that I'm still playing says I never quite made it — but the game became a thread that kept pulling me forward.

From Hawaii to the snow-covered fields of Fort Drum, New York, I kept serving — going through PLDC, Airborne School, even honoring our brothers and sisters as part of a funeral detail. I kept my promise to a friend and went Airborne. I even got good enough at golf to buy a membership for the first time. When I re-enlisted, I had my heart set on Italy. I ended up in Germany. As I signed out of Drum, the world changed on September 11th. That day rewrote all of our futures.

I was stationed in Giessen, Germany where I did a lot of force protection. While there, I eventually found a golf course that let me play, over an hour and a half away (I learned that without an established handicap, you were not allowed on the course.) In my short amount of time in Germany, my daughter Jasmine was born.



PROFESSIONAL GOLFER,

My unit received orders for Operation Iraqi Freedom. I deployed to Iraq on May 9, 2003 and was there until July 21, 2004. At the time, we were the longest deployed unit since WWII. What I saw, what I lived through during those 14 months — left more than physical scars. The Army medically

discharged me on July 25, 2005. I left the battlefield, but the war never really left me.

Post-military life was chaotic. I made bad choices. I guess I was looking for something that I lost in myself. One day, I happened to go on Facebook and started looking up people from my past, and that is where I found Jaymie. I sent her a message and asked her if she remembered me, she said yes, and we chatted back and forth for a bit. Come to find out Jaymie was in California and I was in Las Vegas, so we decided to meet up. We were both in rough relationships. We took a chance — a gamble — and chose each other. I moved to California. Jaymie helped me turn my life around. She even helped me find Maximus Decimus Meridius Denison — my service dog. With Jaymie and Max by my side, I started to breathe again. I found my way back to golf and joined the Veteran Golfers Association (VGA) in 2017. Occasionally on the golf course, I will forget how to swing a club during the middle of a round, but I tend to play it off as if I am checking the wind until I remember again.

In 2019, Jaymie and I left California and moved to San Antonio. I continued to play golf in the VGA and in April 2020, I became one of the Assistant Directors for Texas with Ray Griffiss, a brother in arms and



friend. In February 2022, I had a stroke and tore a hamstring. What hurt most wasn't the pain — it was not being able to golf. Seven painful months later, I picked up my clubs again.

In March 2023, Ray connected me with Dick Goetz from the Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation. Myself and another wounded

warrior were extended an invitation to The Proving Grounds at Ping headquarters in Scottsdale, Arizona. The whole trip was something that I had never experienced in my life.

My golf game started to come together again and I was enjoying myself, feeling good. Soon after, things started changing again. I was in a car accident. As I was driving down the street, someone crashed into the back of my car. On June 29, 2024, the hardest hit yet - I had to lay Max to rest. Out of everything I have been through in my life, this is by far the hardest to deal with. I tell myself all the time how much joy Max brought to everyone's life. Not just, mine but everyone that has crossed paths with, from PGA tour players that met him, to people just walking by and smiling at him. Max was one of a kind. When he passed, I started to withdraw from everything again. I knew I needed another service dog — not to replace Max, because that's impossible — but to carry on what he started. I started the process of getting another one. A friend through golf introduced me to a Golden Retriever breeder, and now I have Kalea.

Jaymie and I would like to thank Ray and Tara Griffiss and Ron Nash. You stepped in at a time when the light at the other end of the tunnel couldn't be seen and we are forever grateful.

AN UNEXPECTED

Reunion

This past November, a remarkable encounter unfolded at Eagles Bluff Golf and Country Club in Tyler, Texas, during the Central Region qualifier for the Veteran Golfers Association's (VGA) Armed Forces Cup on November 2-3, 2024. Two accomplished veterans, each having secured a top-eight regional placement, were preparing for their upcoming matches. One was John Harris, a U.S. Coast Guard veteran, visiting from Norman, Oklahoma. The other was Aaron Rigozzi, a U.S. Marine Corps veteran visiting from South Haven, Michigan.

Although his tournament match was scheduled for mid-morning, John arrived approximately 45 minutes before his tee time to warm up on the near-empty driving range. As he focused on his swing, another golfer wearing a VGA hat joined him a few practice stalls away. Recognizing a fellow military-affiliated competitor, he set aside his club, introduced himself, and initiated a conversation.

Aaron introduced himself and shared where he was visiting

from. Upon conversing a bit more, John mentioned that he had served at a ten-man Coast Guard search-and-rescue station in South Haven from 1967 to 1968. Aaron paused. Most believed the closest station to his hometown was in Grand Haven, and these dates struck a chord. Aaron shared a cherished story: his mother, fresh out of high school in 1968, had been rescued late one night after her sailboat capsized on Lake Michigan. She and three friends had clung to the mast until a four-person Coast Guard crew arrived. This group matched John's own recollection.

As they discussed the rescue, every detail aligned perfectly. This happened at night, four occupants (two women and two men), and a dramatic rescue by a Coast Guard team. At that moment, both men recognized the truth: *John had been part of the crew that rescued Aaron's mother 56 years earlier.* Both men were visibly moved, and the weight of the moment would leave not a single dry eye amongst anyone that witnessed this realization and meeting.

John recalled the rescue night. Though the storm had passed, powerful winds whipped Lake Michigan into 6-8-foot waves. Their 36-foot lifeboat could not approach the overturned sailboat. So, the Coast Guardsmen, each clad in life jackets, swam to the vessel. Each retrieved one woman, returned, and then rescued the two men. Their teamwork and bravery had saved lives, but it was only on this golf range, more than half a century later, that the full significance came to light.

This extraordinary encounter highlights the profound potential of golf: a game that entertains, connects, and sometimes reveals hidden chapters of history. On that crisp November morning, two veterans' paths converged not just as competitors but as witnesses to a legacy of service. A greeting across a few feet of grass led to a story shared anew, a reminder that small moments often open doors to deeper human connection.

Without John and Aaron taking a moment to say hello and introduce themselves to one another, this story might never have surfaced. Instead, golf served a noble purpose: uniting hearts, healing old bonds while creating new ones, and celebrating the enduring spirit of those who serve.

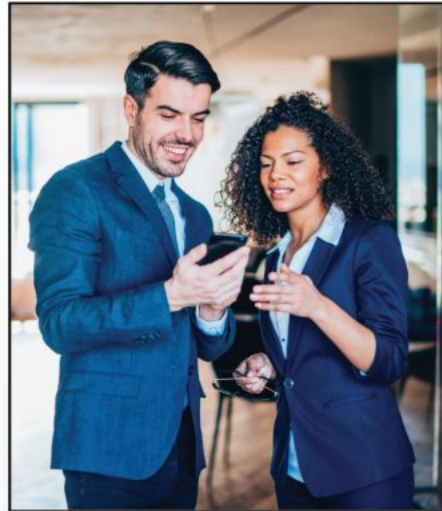

REDEFINING POSSIBILITY THROUGH COURAGE AND SERVICE

Bryan Anderson's story is one of profound courage, unwavering determination, and a commitment to empowering others. He enlisted in the U.S. Army in April 2001 and was deployed to Iraq on September 11 of that same year. Rising to the rank of Sergeant in the Military Police, Anderson completed two tours of duty in Baghdad, where he led police training initiatives and also served as a prison guard at Leavenworth Federal Penitentiary.

In October 2005, Bryan faced a life-altering moment when he was seriously injured by an IED in Baghdad. The incident resulted in the loss of both legs and his left hand. He received the Purple Heart in recognition of his service and bravery. Following 13 months of intensive rehabilitation at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Bryan emerged as one of the few triple amputees from the Iraq War who regained independence.

Rather than be defined by his injuries, Bryan chose to embrace a mission of inspiration. He authored his memoir, *No Turning Back*, sharing his journey of resilience and hope. He also ventured into the world of film and television, with roles and stunt work in productions like *CSI: NY*, *The Dark Knight*, *The Wrestler*, *American Sniper*, and *Hawaii Five-0*.

As National Spokesman for Quantum Rehab and USA Cares, Bryan travels nationwide to rehabilitation centers and VA

hospitals, delivering empowering messages of perseverance and determination. He consults on wheelchair design and advocates for dignity and inclusion for all with disabilities.

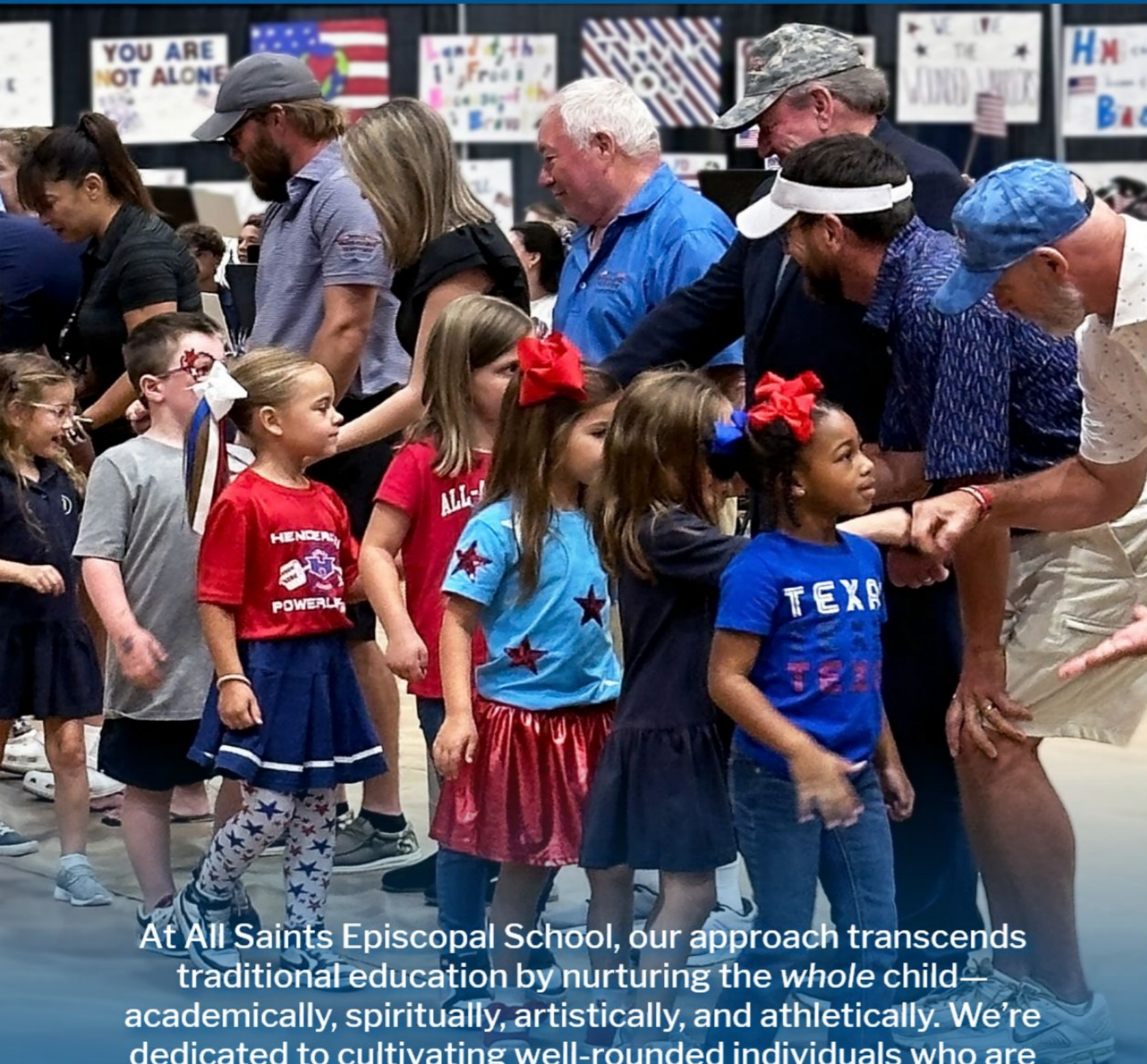
A passionate athlete and adventurer, Bryan has competed in, and won, medals at the National Veterans Wheelchair Games in table tennis and archery. He continues to push physical and personal boundaries through snowboarding, skydiving, rock climbing, and more, inspiring others to challenge their own limits.

At the heart of Bryan Anderson's work lies a belief: adversity can be transformed into opportunity. He embodies a powerful message—that courage, innovation, and compassion can redefine what's possible, both in recovery and in service.

ALL SAINTS EPISCOPAL STUDENTS ARE MAKING A DIFFERENCE



At All Saints Episcopal School in Tyler, Texas, students are learning to lead with empathy and impact far beyond the classroom. Since launching the "Makers on a Mission" initiative in 2016, the school has empowered students to develop solutions that enhance the lives of people with disabilities—exemplifying its mission to nurture not just academic excellence, but compassion, creativity, and service.

The journey began during the 9th Annual Texas Wounded Warrior Pro-Am Weekend, when wounded warrior and triple-amputee Sergeant Bryan Anderson visited campus. His candid account of using prosthetic limbs in daily life deeply resonated with students. Anderson helped spark a wave of creativity—students brainstormed enhancements for prosthetic design, integrating both utility and aesthetics. This foundational moment ignited a movement to reimagine assistive technology through compassion and innovation.

That initial spark evolved into ongoing partnerships, including with UT Tyler's School of Occupational Therapy. Students addressed real-world challenges designing adaptive water bottle openers to aid individuals recovering from strokes or spinal injuries by restoring independence in simple tasks. Their projects have further extended to mobility aids and therapeutic devices that support fine-motor skills recovery.



Over the course of the coming year, the program expanded to include collaboration with the East Texas Autism Network. Under this initiative, students designed low-sensory bubble tubes, tools proven to support children with autism through calming visual stimulation and sensory development. These devices foster visual engagement, color recognition, and emotional regulation.

The impact is not confined to children. At Camp V, a veteran-focused initiative, students created over 20 assistive tools addressing veterans' needs from hearing aids and wheelchair ramps to gardening tools, providing meaningful, everyday support.



Reflecting on the initiative's reach, Anderson remarked, "*When we allow students to explore and build based on real human needs, we're giving them the opportunity to be leaders and changemakers.*" His involvement with Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation powerfully underscores the transformative potential of connection, creativity, and community engagement.

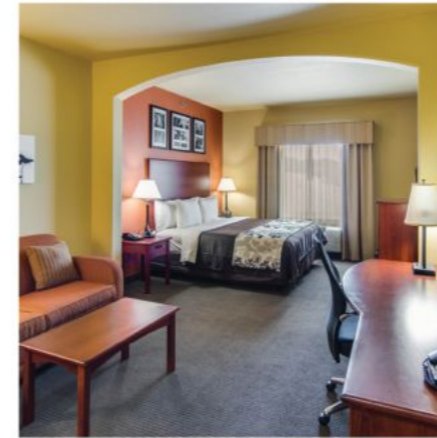

Additionally, it serves to ensure that the crew becomes thoroughly acquainted with the vessel's systems and procedures, thereby enhancing overall readiness and operational effectiveness.

A Special Thanks to Patriot Paws

In June, Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation (TXWWF) further developed its relationship with Patriot Paws, a disability services and support organization in Rockwall, Texas, whose mission is to provide highly trained service dogs at no cost to disabled veterans and others with mobile disabilities in order to assist with restoring their physical and emotional independence. What sets Patriot Paws apart is their comprehensive approach—they breed, raise, and train every dog in-house, ensuring each one is fully prepared to serve the veterans they're matched with.

The journey for a dog to become a certified service animal typically takes around two years. During our early conversations with Patriot Paws, we identified a gap in communication between the organization and the veterans awaiting service dogs. To help bridge that gap, we proposed—and offered to sponsor—a weekend experience for those veterans. This event would give them an inside look at the training process and allow them to participate in a mini “boot camp” focused on learning how to interact with a service dog.

The inaugural weekend of this new opportunity kicked off on a Saturday morning with a meet-and-greet, followed by a guided tour of the facility. Participants observed the trainers as they worked with the dogs, then took part in a Q&A session to learn more about the program and its operations.

After lunch, the veterans had the opportunity to work hands-on with the dogs under the supervision of the trainers, gaining first hand experience of what the actual training program entails. Throughout the day, there was ongoing camaraderie and meaningful interaction among all the attending veterans. That evening, we gathered for dinner at Culpepper Cattle Company, where the sense of connection continued.

On Sunday morning, representatives from both the PTSD Foundation of America and the Texas Wounded Warrior Foundation met to share insights into their missions and the important work each organization does. The presentations sparked thoughtful questions and meaningful conversations that continued well after the sessions ended. Overall, it was an incredibly impactful weekend—one that left a lasting impression on everyone involved.

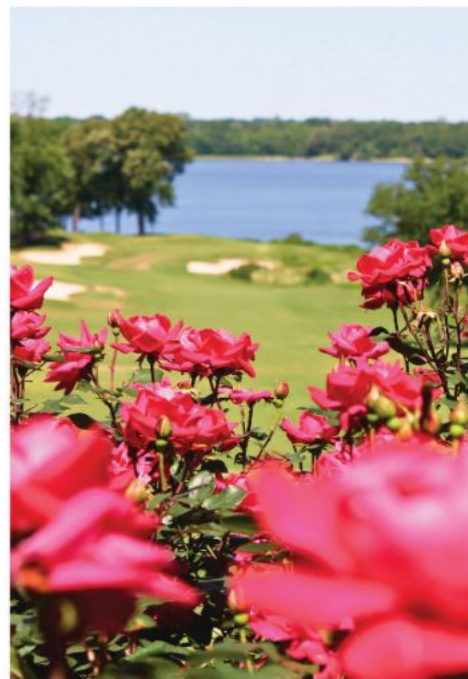

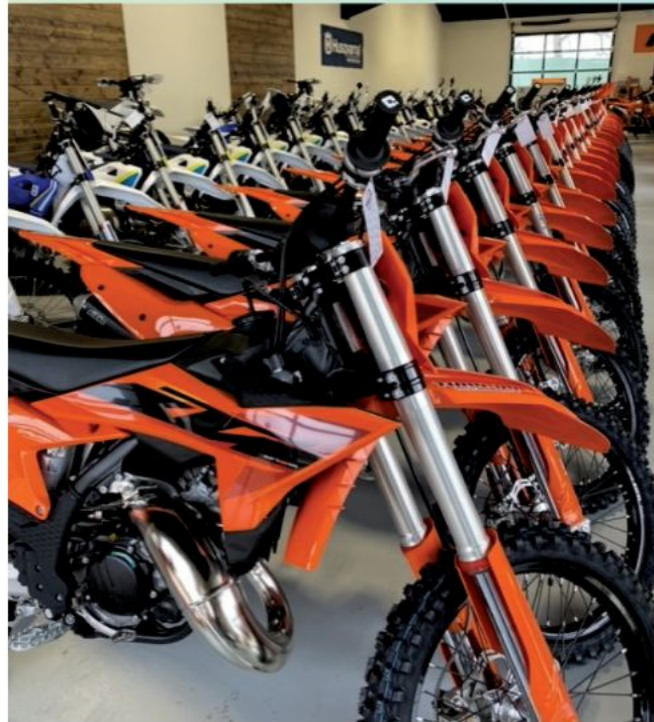
